Mayor Visits Kalkadoon Exhibition Mount Isa Mayor Peta MacRae recently visited the "Unbroken Spirit of the Kalkadoons" exhibition currently on display in the State Library of Queensland in Brisbane.

The exhibition opened on March 22 and will run until August 24, and shares Kalkadunga artist **Colleen Sam's family story through** paintings, digital stories, and archival materials. "The exhibition was an eye-opening experience, and I would encourage anyone visiting Brisbane to pop in and take a look," Cr MacRae said.

The stories showcased in the exhibition follow the Sam family's journey of survival from the first contact in the 1850s through to the 1900s, highlighting key figures such as Kalkadoon senior law keepers King Jimmy and Queen Nellie, along with the resilient warrior Wild Harry, a survivor of Battle Mountain.
